MILITARY PHARMACIES RESUME REGULAR **OPERATIONS AFTER CYBERATTACK**

Military Times reported April 8 that military pharmacies have returned to full operations, six weeks after a cyberattack on the nation's largest commercial prescription processor disrupted

normal business at thousands of pharmacies around the world.

Following the Feb. 21 hack, Change Healthcare - which verifies whether a customer's health insurance will help cover the cost of each medication - discon-

nected its system from other parts of the medical ecosystem in an attempt to limit the attack's impact. Military pharmacies were able to manually fill prescriptions in the company's absence, but warned customers of longer wait times.

Most retail pharmacies restarted filling and refilling patients' prescriptions by March 8, after much of Change Healthcare's network had regained function. according to officials from Optum, the UnitedHealth Group subsidiary that oversees Change. But on-base pharmacies lagged behind for multiple weeks as Change worked with Defense Health Agency officials to reestablish its connection to that separate network.

The connection was restored the week of April 1, a company spokesperson told Military Times April 5. Defense Health Agency officials didn't respond to a request for information about the status of the pharmacies.

At least one military pharmacy has continued to warn of extended wait times as it recovers from the disruption.

"Pharmacy services have been fully restored and we have returned to a fully operational status, including the filling of controlled substances," the 19th Medical Group at Little Rock Air Force Base, Arkansas, said in an April 3 Facebook post.

Earlier, Defense Health Agency officials acknowledged that some beneficiaries may have been asked to pay full price for their prescriptions at Tricare's in-network retail pharmacies affected by the Change Healthcare outage. Those customers should file a claim for reimbursement with Tricare.

Former 3rd Fleet commander takes Pacific Fleet's helm

JOINT BASE PEARL HARBOR-HICKAM, Hawaii - A naval aviator and former commander of 3rd Fleet assumed command of U.S. Pacific Fleet during an April 4 ceremony in Hawaii.

Adm. Stephen Koehler replaces Adm. Samuel Paparo, who is slated to take the reins of U.S. Indo-Pacific Command next month. Paparo will replace Adm. John Aquilino, who has headed Indo-Pacific Command since April 2021.

During remarks at the pier-side ceremony, Aquilino was effusive in his praise for Paparo and Koehler, describing them as "the world's greatest warfighters.

Pacific Fleet's area of operation encompasses roughly 100 million square miles, spanning from the Arctic in the north to Antarctica in the south.

The fleet consists of about 200 ships, 1,500 aircraft and 150,000 uniformed and civilian personnel.

Koehler is a 1986 graduate of the University of Colorado at Boulder and was commissioned through the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps, according to his official Navy biography.

He was designated a naval aviator in March 1989 and has flown more than 3,900 hours in F-14 Tomcat and F-18 Super Hornet fighter jets, making 600 carrier landings.

Among his career commands were amphibious assault ship USS Bataan, aircraft carrier USS Dwight D. Eisenhower and Carrier Strike Group 9.

His tours supported operations Desert Storm, Southern Watch, Iraqi Freedom, Inherent Resolve and Freedom's Sentinel.

He was a deputy commander for Pacific Fleet and commanded the San Diego-based 3rd Fleet. Most recently, he was director for strategy, plans and policy with the Joint Staff in the Pentagon. (see photo, page 8)

CNO: INVESTING IN INDUSTRIAL BASE, GROWING THE FLEET ARE TOP PRIORITIES

Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Lisa Franchetti said April 8 that investing in the defense industrial base to increase the size of the Navy's fleet in coming years is a top priority for the Department of the Navy.

The CNO made her remarks during a panel discussion that kicked off this year's Sea-Air-Space maritime exposition just outside of Washington.

"We know we need a larger Navy," said Franchetti. "Every study since 2016 has shown that; and I think the most effective way to work on that right now is to invest in our industrial base, invest in the workforce [and] invest alongside our industry partners... to speed up the production and throughput of the ships and submarines that we need."

The Navy currently has 88 ships under contract, with 66 of them currently under construction, Franchetti said.

"When I look at our ability to be a standing force, a crisis response force [and] a force that is ready to go today ... [that all] relies heavily, crucially and critically on the U.S. Navy," Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps Gen. Christopher J. Mahoney, who was also on the panel with Franchetti, said

of how Navy amphibious ships directly contribute to the Marine Corps being able to execute its mission.

Concurring with Franchetti's assessment of the need to strengthen the industrial base, Mahoney said that he believes bundling future purchases of amphibious ships would not only save the taxpayer money but would also attract more workers to the shipbuilding industry thanks to multi-year job security.

"And not just pipe fitters and welders," Mahoney said, "but managers, engineers and architects that otherwise might not see a future that far out."

During the panel, Franch-

etti and Mahoney offered their perspectives on the Navy's shipbuilding industry, as a result of both leaders having recently toured various shipyards along the Gulf Coast

"All of the industry partners are facing some of the same challenges in the workforce [that the military is], said Franchetti. "So, we're working alongside industry to generate some of these pipelines where people can be recruited, they can come in and get training, and they come out with a certification and then immediately go and be employed," she further explained.

When asked about how much responsibility to build up the industrial base both DOD and industry should share, Franchetti and Mahoney each agreed that such responsibility should be closely and mutually shared.

"It has to be a partnership with [DOD] and industry," said Franchetti. "It's a commitment on the part of both to be able to move forward."

According to the Congressional Budget Office, there were 290 battle force ships in the Navy's fleet at the start of fiscal year 2024. The sea service hopes to upscale that number to the mid-to-high 300s by 2053.

Additional naval priorities the CNO listed during the panel included near-term readiness of the force and investment in the upcoming Columbia class of nuclear-powered ballistic missile submarines.

Army's top Pacific leader mum on 'where or when' new missiles will deploy

TOKYO - The U.S. Army will field newly developed missiles in the Indo-Pacific region this year with additional types in the pipeline, it's Pacific-area commander told reporters on a recent visit to the Japanese capital.

"I'm not going to discuss what system and I'm not going to say where and when," Gen. Charles Flynn said during a media roundtable April 2 at the U.S. Embassy. "I'm just saying that there will be a long-range precision fires capability."

The U.S. and allies Japan and the Philippines are gearing up for a potential fight with China, which boasts a formidable missile force, around Taiwan or in the South China Sea.

In November, Flynn told reporters at the Halifax International Security Forum in Canada that the Army would deploy a limited number of

Tomahawk and SM-6 missiles to the region, according to a Nov. 19 report in Defense One.

Land-based Tomahawks, with a range of over 1,500 miles, were banned under the 1987 Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces Treaty. But the U.S. pulled out of the treaty in 2019, due to Russian non-

compliance, and the Marine Corps established its first Tomahawk unit in July 2023 at Camp Pendleton.

"I'm not going to say where or when we will deploy in 2024," Flynn said in Japan. "There's actually multiple systems in development."

Flynn during the Tokyo

roundtable mentioned the Typhoon launcher, which is designed to fire the SM-6 and Tomahawk missiles. That system has a "hypersonic capability," he said, referring to missiles that can travel faster than five times the speed of sound.

Flynn also spoke about the long-range, anti-ship Precision Strike Missile, which is set to reach initial operating capability this year.

"This new surface-to-surface weapon system will deliver enhanced capabilities to attack, neutralize, suppress and destroy targets using missile-delivered indirect fires out to 499+ kilometers (310+ miles)," manufacturer Lockheed Martin wrote on its website.

"We shoot HIMARS in a number of these countries today," Flynn said in Halifax. "This is just a different missile to put into it. So, I don't necessarily think we need to have an agreement (with other countries) ahead of time."

U.S., Chinese military officials resume talks on operational safety

Military officials from the U.S. and China met last week for working-level talks focused on ensuring safe and professional air and naval interactions between their forces.

The two-day discussions, held in Honolulu, marked the resumption of the Military Maritime Consultative Agreement Working Group, a series of annual operational safety dialogues. The MMCA dialogues were established more than two decades ago: they were last held in December 2021.

This year's discussions included representatives from U.S. Indo-Pacific Command. U.S. Pacific Fleet and U.S. Pacific Air Forces, who met with their counterparts from China's People's Liberation Army.

The head of the U.S. delegation, Army Col. Ian Francis, Indo-Pacom's director of Northeast Asia policy, said the delegation is encouraged by representatives from China's army honoring their commitment to attend the talks. He said he looks forward to future discussions aimed at safeguarding forces operating in the region.

"The Military Maritime Consultative Agreement is U.S. Indo-Pacom's primary means to directly discuss air and maritime operational safety with the PLA," Francis said. "The United States will continue to operate safely and professionally in the Indo-Pacific wherever international law allows, and we take this responsibility serinications with the PLA and with all other military forces in the region is of utmost importance to avoid accidents and miscommunication,"

During this year's MMCA, officials from both countries reviewed specific instances of safety-related events in the region that have occurred in recent years. The officials also discussed sustaining maritime and aviation operational safety and professionalism

President Joe Biden secured China's agreement to return to military-to-military talks in November after meeting with Chinese President Xi Jinping during the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation forum in Woodside, Calif...

That meeting was quickly followed by talks between Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Air Force Gen. CO Brown. Jr., and his Chinese military counterpart, People's Liberation Army Gen. Liu Zhenli, in December.

In January, senior U.S. and Chinese military officials resumed the U.S.-China Defense Policy Coordination Talks at the Pentagon. The high-level talks were last held in September 2021

According to the most recent China Military Power Report, the U.S. has documented more than 180 coercive and risky air intercepts against U.S. aircraft in the region between 2021 and 2023.

That is more risky intercepts in the past two years than in the past decade, according to the report.

In previewing this week's militaryto-military talks, defense officials noted a decrease in China's unsafe behavior toward U.S. maritime and air operators in the region.

"We've observed a reduction in unsafe behavior between us and

last several months," a senior military official said. "So, we're encouraged by that, and we're happy that we have this opportunity with the MMCA to talk about ways to make sure that trend continues in the right direction."

U.S. officials noted they maintain concerns over China's continued unsafe behavior toward non-U.S. maritime operations in the region.

"In recent months, we do continue to see the PRC acting very dangerously and unlawfully against routine maritime operations the Philippines was conducting in the South China Sea "a senior defense official said. "We'll continue to press [China] on those issues.'

During the discussion, Biden emphasized the importance of maintaining peace and stability across the Taiwan Strait. He also raised concerns over China's support of Russia's defense industrial base.

The two leaders "welcomed ongoing efforts to maintain open channels of communication and responsibly manage the relationship" through diplomatic channels and workinglevel dialogue, according to the summary of their talk.

Expert landscaping tips for choosing and installing plants

(StatePoint) The perfect landscape may start with a healthy, lush lawn, but for interest and depth, you'll also need to consider the plants that surround it.

Thankfully, it's easy to make considerable improvements to your backyard life using tips from professionals. Landscape designer Doug Scott has partnered with lawn care equipment manufacturer Exmark, to offer these tips for selecting and installing plants that will beautify your outdoor living areas.

Choosing Plants

• Choose plants well-suited for your specific growing conditions. Knowing your growing zone is important, however you should also be mindful how conditions like sun exposure can change as you move around vour vard.

• Choose the right size plants for the space. Bear in mind that what you're planting today is much smaller than what it will be once it's matured. Always read a

plant's care label to understand your foreground layer should its optimal growing conditions and size at maturity.

• From a design perspective, think in terms of texture, layers and drifts. When addressing the overall texture of your planting beds, choose plants that vary in form, size, color and leaf structure. This will create greater interest, and a space that's more visually appealing and enjoyable to spend time in.

For a lush look, think in terms of layers when considering composition. Much like in a painting, you should have background, middle ground, and foreground layers. Your background layer should consist of taller evergreen shrubs to provide something alive and green to look at all year long, no matter what's happening in front of them. Your middle ground layer should be lower than the background layer to create interest, and is where you can add a contrasting evergreen shrub or pop of color with a perennial plant. Finally,

help transition the planting beds to your lawn space. You can accomplish this with smaller perennials, evergreens, annuals or creeping ground covers.

When addressing drifts, read the plant labels to know how large they'll grow. This can help ensure plants grow in together as they mature, but are not overcrowded.

Installing Them

- 1. Dig a hole that's about two times the diameter of the pot your plant's being transplanted form, and about the depth of the pot.
- 2. Mend in compost or soil conditioner to give your plant the organic material it needs to thrive. If you'd like, add slowrelease fertilizer, and mix well.
- 3. Place your plant in the hole, making sure that it sits at, or just above, the level it did in
 - 4. Backfill with soil, stopping

to add water when the hole is about halfway full.

- 5. Fill the rest of the hole with soil, then firmly press down.
- 6. Soak your plant with more
- 7. Finish by adding mulch, making sure it's pulled away from the base of your plant.

Expedited naturalization returns to MCRD San Diego

As recruits arrived at Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego recently, a new chapter of patriotism and opportunity unfolded. With the revival of expedited naturalization, eight recruits from the 12th Marine Corps District arrived to embark on a journey that will conclude with both the title Marine and U.S. citizen.

Commencing April 1, Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego and Western Recruiting Region, in collaboration with the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services, have reinstated the expedited naturalization program in order to provide qualified recruits the opportunity

"It's an opportunity for us to bring in non-U.S. citizens that have I-551 Green Cards that are going through the typical naturalization process," said CWO3

to become naturalized U.S. citi- Matthew Alderman, the enlisted operations officer for 12th MCD. "April 1 is going to be the first week we turned this program back on in several years.'

> According to Alderman, the district's goal was to get at least half of the qualified shippers leaving for recruit training on April 1 to submit for the program. Ultimately, the district had eight eligible shippers and all eight elected to participate.

> "I think it's awesome" said Alderman. "It's an excellent sign of what's to come and I hope they keep applying. There's really no draw back here.'

> Since 2002, more than 148,000 service members have been naturalized, and many were assisted in the process through the DoD and USCIS partnerships such as the "Naturalization at Basic Training Initiative."

"It's not difficult and it's available to any immigrant that's in our pool that's a non-citizen that's shipping," said Alderman. "The only steps required prior to shipping are to complete the N-400 form application for naturalization and get a passport photo taken and then everything else is done here on the depot including the extra fingerprints."

Upon arrival at Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego, during receiving week, the WRR Recruit Liaison Section will assist the recruit in obtaining a signed USCIS Form N-426, also known as a Request for Certification of Military or Naval Service, and submitting their application. While the recruit is in training, the liaison will mail the recruit's fingerprint cards on their behalf to the USCIS National Benefits Center for processing.

During the recruit's Team

Week, USCIS will interview the applicant, administer the citizenship test, and administer the Oath of Allegiance. At this point, the recruit will be a naturalized citizen of the United States of

Lastly, during the final week of recruit training on Family Day, a ceremony will be held to present the new U.S. citizens with their naturalization certifi-



Melatonin is a hormone naturally produced in the brain that's linked to your body's sleep and wake cycle. The natural release of melatonin is stimulated by darkness and suppressed by daylight. It's also available as a supplement that you can take as a pill or chewable gummy.

As a supplement, a small dose can trigger your body to produce melatonin that makes you feel sleepy and helps you fall asleep.

More people are asking their healthcare team about melatonin and report using it, including parents giving it to children. Here's what you need to know about melatonin use in children and how to improve sleep hygiene without a sleep aid.

Research on melatonin

In the U.S., melatonin is available over the counter as a dietary supplement. This differs from other countries, such as the United Kingdom, Japan and Australia, where melatonin is regulated as a prescription medication.

Research has shown that melatonin is generally safe for short-term use in adults and adolescents. Fewer studies have been done to evaluate the effects of its long-term use and safety. It's also unclear whether melatonin supplements are safe for children.

Melatonin use/side effects

While melatonin can help children fall asleep, it doesn't keep them asleep. Difficulty falling or staying asleep can be a sign of an issue in the body, including:

- · Enlarged tonsils or adenoids can lead to snoring or obstructive sleep apnea.
- In children who have nightmares, melatonin may make dreams more vivid, which can worsen sleep.

That's why it's crucial to consult with your child's healthcare team to find and treat issues causing sleep disturbances.

Melatonin may be recommended for children with neurological conditions like autism spectrum disorder or attention-deficit/hyperactivity $disorder (ADHD) and \, managed \, with \,$ routine evaluation and follow-up by their healthcare team.

In gummy form, melatonin supplements can be enticing for children. leading to a risk of overconsumption. Taking a large dose of melatonin can cause gastrointestinal issues or irritability. A large dose also can keep your child's body from naturally producing melatonin to make them sleepy.

Evaluate sleep hygiene

Melatonin use is intended as a short-term aid. When sleep issues are a long-term problem for children, evaluating sleep habits and the environment can identify the causes of those issues. Here are some things to consider when striving for good sleep hygiene:

- Screen use. Looking at a backlight screen tells the brain it's time to be awake and engaged.
 - · Have a routine.
- Create a sleep-friendly space. A dark, quiet room is ideal for sleep. Lights should be kept low or dim.

Vaping linked to 19% higher risk of heart failure, study finds

The study notes that vaping specifically increases the risk of a form of heart failure known as heart failure with preserved ejection fraction.

People who use vapes have a higher risk of heart failure compared to those who have never used e-cigarettes.

According to a new study published by the American College of Cardiology, researchers analyzed data from a larger study that examined the link between e-cigarette use and new cases of heart failure, and found that among 175,667 participants,

those who had used e-cigarettes were 19% more likely to develop heart failure.

'More and more studies are linking e-cigarettes to harmful effects and finding that it might not be as safe as previously thought," said the study's lead author, Dr. Yakubu Bene-Alhasan. "The difference we saw was substantial. It's worth considering the consequences to your health, especially with regard to heart health."

When researchers looked at different types of heart failure, the study notes that they found that using e-cigarettes specifically increased the risk of one type of heart failure called HFpEF, or heart failure with preserved ejection fraction, in which the heart muscle gets stiff and doesn't fill with blood properly between contractions. The latest data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

shows that in the U.S., 4.5% of adults over the age of 18 use ecigarettes. Meanwhile, 25.2% of middle and high school students who used e-cigarettes reported using them daily, with a striking 89.4% reporting the use of flavored e-cigarettes.

The CDC also notes that most of these cigarettes contain nicotine, which is highly addictive and also harms brain development in vounger people.

What to know about the rise of colorectal cancer in younger adults

Rates of colorectal cancer have been rising consistently in younger adults — a trend that concerns surgeons and other medical professionals at the forefront of treating the disease

"We've been noticing an alarming rise in colorectal cancer in adults under the age of 50. In fact, people born in the 1990s are two times more likely than people born in the 1950s to develop colorectal cancer," said James T. McCormick, DO, FACS, FASCRS, a colorectal surgeon and American College of Surgeons Commission on Cancer (CoC) State Chair of the Pennsylvania chapter. "And that's remarkably striking. We're not quite sure why that's happening or how to screen for it at such a young age. That's the conundrum

How much is colorectal cancer increasing in younger adults?

Researchers have noted a 15% increase in colon cancer diagnoses in people aged 18-50 since 2004, according to hospital-based data from the National Cancer Database (NCDB). By comparison, there was only a 3% increase in colon cancer diagnoses in adults aged 45-55 during the same period.

The NCDB, a clinical oncology database jointly operated by the CoC and the American Cancer cers in the U.S.

Colorectal cancer is also killing more young adults. According to the American Cancer Society. colorectal cancer is now the leading cause of cancer deaths in men vounger than 50 and the second leading cause of cancer deaths in women of the same age group.

Why is colorectal cancer increasing among young people?

The exact causes behind the increase of colorectal cancer in younger people are not fully understood. However, most experts believe that the rise results from multiple factors, including environmental changes, potential exposure to toxins, genetic factors that may increase a person's risk of developing the disease earlier in life, and lifestyle factors such as high consumption of ultra-processed foods. Research is ongoing.

What can people do to prevent colorectal cancer?

Despite the unknown, there are several steps everyone can take to reduce their risk. First and foremost, ACS experts recommend that people of all ages remain vigilant and report any changes in bowel habits, including bleeding and persistent changes such as constipation or diarrhea, to

ask questions.

"I think a lot of prevention starts with awareness." said Paula Denova, MD. "We've all seen patients who had rectal bleeding that was dismissed as hemorrhoids or IBS symptoms for a while before they were found to have colorectal cancer. Knowing your family history is also critically important."

Starting at age 45, all people should be screened for colorectal cancer annually. Screening may need to start earlier for people with a family history of the disease or for people considered high-risk for the disease due to other health factors.


The gold standard of colorectal cancer screening is with a colonoscopy, which can help physicians detect colorectal cancer at


its earliest stage, when it's more treatable, and even prevent colorectal cancer through the detection and removal of precancerous growths called polyps. Screening with colonoscopy may be one factor of many that has resulted in nearly 16,000 fewer colon cancer diagnoses among older adults per year, according to hospitalbased data from the NCDB. Still. approximately 1 in 4 adults of screening age are not up to date with colorectal cancer screening recommendations, according to national data estimates.

Finally, exercising regularly to maintain a healthy body weight and eating a balanced diet high in lean meat, fiber, whole grains, vegetables, and fruits may also help reduce risk.


